Bells Across America for Fallen Firefighters



or the third year, the entire country is invited to come together as one community to honor the memory of firefighters who died in the line of duty and reassure their loved ones that their

firefighter will not be forgotten.

Fire departments, places of worship, community organizations and individuals from coast to coast will join the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation in this poignant tribute, *Bells Across America for Fallen Firefighters*, as part of the National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Weekend in Emmitsburg, Maryland.

"The ringing of bells has a powerful meaning to firefighters. Not only do bells signal the beginning or end of a call, they also were used to notify department members that one of their own had died while serving the community," explained Chief Ronald Siarnicki, executive director of the NFFF. "At the beginning of the Memorial Service on Sunday, October 6, the bells at the National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Chapel in Emmitsburg will ring to honor the memories of those who made the ultimate sacrifice in 2012. We are encouraging firefighters across the country to invite their places of worship and community organizations to join us with their own tribute to all our fallen heroes."

The moment of remembrance can occur at any time on October 5 or 6. Fire department representatives are encouraged to work with local clergy and community leaders to develop an appropriate tribute. Some suggestions include ringing chapel bells, a moment of silence, a brief prayer, a hymn, or tolling a ceremonial bell by members of the fire department.

REMEMBERING THE OTHER VICTIMS OF LODDS

hree weeks after 19 firefighters were killed in the Yarnell Hill Fire, Prescott Valley (Ariz.) Fire Capt. Joe Kelley and Central Yavapai Fire District Engineer Bob Curry faced a tough

decision — whether to hold the fifth-annual Northern Arizona National Fallen Firefighters Foundation golf tournament scheduled for Sept. 14 or cancel the event.

Kelley said he and Curry are late in promoting and organizing this year's event because of the memorial and funerals for the hotshots, but they decided to hold the event "in honor of our 19 heroes," he said.

The Prescott Valley tournament is one of 30 golf tournaments held across the U.S. to raise money for the NFFF programs, which include the National Fallen Firefighters Memorial weekend, Fire Service Survivor Conferences, the Camp for Children of Fallen Firefighters and scholarships. The NFFF also supports and educates fire departments with Everyone Goes Home, Local Assistance State Teams and Taking Care of Our Own programs. Each of these programs costs money, though most are run by volunteers.

The NFFF was created in 1992 to honor fallen firefighters and assist their surviving family members and coworkers. The organization has expanded and grown in services they provide to families, but also to fire departments. In 2004, the NFFF brought together industry leaders to develop programs to change the fire service culture and become proactive in firefighter safety.

At press time, the number of firefighter line-of-duty deaths was 69, just 14 fewer than in all of 2012. A fourth-consecutive year of declining LODDs seems unlikely.

But what we sometimes forget after an LODD is that "losing a firefighter creates more survivors," said Mike Falese, chief of the Bartlett Fire Protection District and president of the Illinois Fire Chiefs Association.

The association recently supported the Illinois Firefighter Life Safety Task Force in hosting the first Illinois Survivors' Conference. The NFFF hosts an annual National Survivors' Conference, but Illinois is only the second to host a state conference. There, 25 wives, parents, siblings and coworkers gathered to learn about the services offered by NFFF, but primarily they were there to network with other survivors.

Among the attendees in the room were a woman who lost her firefighter husband in 1955 and a firefighter who lost his father in a fire and lost a co-worker two years later. "We didn't mean to join this group, but I'm glad to be here," said the wife of a Chicago fallen firefighter.

This year, a series of multiple-fatality incidents — in Houston and West, Texas, and then in Prescott, Ariz. — has left a staggering number of spouses, family and coworkers all struggling to understand and survive the sudden loss of their loved ones. In this issue, NFFF Executive Director Ron Siarnicki describes the organization's response to the West tragedy. (See page 24.)

As the numbers of LODD survivors grows, so does the need to provide services. Many fire departments have organized fund-raising efforts for the NFFF programs. Stair climbs and golf tournaments each contribute to the funding. Pierce Mfg. and Ford Motor Co. have combined efforts and are offering a raffle of a specially decorated Ford F-150 pickup truck, to be featured this month at Fire-Rescue International. All proceeds will benefit the NFFF.

In 2009, Kelley never dreamed that organizing a golf tournament would one day benefit the surviving family members of his peers. The fire service truly is a family and unlike any other profession.

rian Munz lost his life fighting a fire on July 22, 2008. He was 24 years old. Brian will not be forgotten in his hometown of Fairbury, Illinois. The town has raised over \$300,000,

and the voters approved issuing \$500,000 in bonds to finance construction of the Brian J. Munz Safety Complex. The new facility will house the SELCAS ambulance service and the Fairbury Fire Department. Brian was very dedicated to training, and the new

facility will have a place for training as well as some new equipment.

The groundbreaking service was held on July 2, 2013. Brian's dad, Jim; his mom, Karen; and his brother, Greg; broke ground in the presence of fellow firemen, ambulance staff, family, friends, and townspeople.



2013-2014 FOUNDATION SARBANES SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS



nce again this year, a wonderful and very deserving group of survivors received help in pursuing their dreams through the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation's Sarbanes Scholarship Program. With help from a

generous donation from the Motorola Foundation, the NFFF and its scholarship partners, ICMA-RC, National Association of State Fire Marshals, and Global Health and Safety, awarded a total of \$246,468 in scholarships to 82 children, stepchildren, and spouses of fallen firefighters. Here are a few interesting facts about this diverse and talented group:

- Of the 82 recipients, 55 are previous recipients and 27 received scholarships for the first time
- The ages of scholarship recipients range from 18 to 53
- Scholarship recipients come from 29 different states and will attend institutions in 35 different states
- Scholarship recipients are preparing for careers ranging from nursing to aerospace engineering, and three recipients are enrolled in a fire science program

The NFFF has awarded a total of more than \$2.2 million in scholarships since the program was created in 1997, and our partners have awarded more than \$600,000.

FIRE SERVICE CORNER

= Life Safety Initiative #7 =

Create a national research agenda and data collection system that relates to the 16 Firefighter Life Safety Initiatives.



n 2004, when the 16 Firefighter Life Safety Initiatives were created, a group of fire service leaders pointed out that there should be a guide for researchers to use to develop new

technologies to improve firefighter safety. In addition, the group recognized the need to develop consistent data collection systems to better track line-of-duty injuries and fatalities, as well as ways to improve fire department operations.

In 2005 and 2011, the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation hosted Research Agenda Symposiums. Both events were highly successful in identifying areas of possible research with a focus on firefighter safety. The reports can be downloaded from the Resources section of www.EveryoneGoesHome.com. Highlights of the last research agenda symposium include the following recommendations:

COMMUNITY RISK REDUCTION:

Creation of a community-scale model that evaluates fire prevention and response programs and quantifies their ability to produce a potentially positive outcome. This may include data pertaining to: occupancy types and numbers of each, fire prevention, codes adoption, mitigation, response, and recovery.

WILDLAND:

Development of safe and reliable aircraft operations for suppression and team transportation to reduce wildland firefighting injuries and fatalities.



DATA COLLECTION:

Identification of cultural perception of data collection and barriers to capture of quality data.

TECHNOLOGY AND FIRE SERVICE SCIENCE:

Development of data, implementation of transfer mechanisms, and updating of standards that will enable firefighters to learn the science and utilize the technology required to respond to the changing fire conditions in our modern built environment.

HEALTH AND WELLNESS:

Effectiveness of intervention and screening for health and disease related to firefighter wellness and fitness.

SERVICE DELIVERY:

Development of a scientifically-based community risk assessment tool.

TOOLS AND EQUIPMENT:

Assessment of current PPE (entire ensemble) performance, functionality and related safety features for today's fire environment.

Ultimately, the 41 recommendations contained in this report should serve as a roadmap for all researchers and applied scientists who are interested in firefighter safety and survivability.

An ongoing concern within the fire service has been the need to collect data and to make operational decisions based on empirical data, as opposed to anecdotal or theory-based information. Although experience and a thorough knowledge base of information is vital to emergency operations, we live in a time when city managers, political leaders, and budget analysts require empirical data to justify the use of public funds. With the assistance of our partners, Honeywell and the United States Fire Administration, the Foundation is working on a Vulnerability Assessment Program (VAP). The VAP will give fire service leaders the ability to input information in a webbased program to help them identify vulnerabilities that may lead to firefighter injuries or fatalities.

"Properly working smoke alarms and a home fire escape plan keeps residents and firefighters out of harm's way," said Chief Ronald J. Siarnicki, executive director of the NFFF. The Be a Hero, Save a Hero® campaign launched last November with a multi-faceted campaign surrounding the CMA Music Awards in Nashville. A public service announcement featuring country music singer and former American Idol finalist, Bucky Covington, premiered that evening on the ABC broadcast while fire service leaders attended the press event at the downtown Nashville Fire Department. NFA Approves Foundation Training Programs!



orking with the North American Fire Training Directors, the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation submitted two training programs for firefighters— Courage To Be Safe® and Leadership,

Accountability, Culture, Knowledge (LACK)—to the National Fire Academy (NFA) to be considered for their approved training class list. This has several benefits. As approved courses are eligible for NFA certificates of completion, federal grants for training from the NFA can be used to offer these programs. It also requires a partnership with the state fire training entity to assist in accomplishing the programs, as they are the official agent of the NFA.

It was a long process, but after many months of waiting and "checking in" we received word that the two courses have been approved! Great news! This is another way we can assure that these key safety lessons are made even more accessible to the United States fire service. The next step in this process is to establish protocols for the delivery, which we'll be working on at a meeting with the North American Fire Training Directors in September.

A special thanks to the Bureau of Fire Service Training in Iowa, under the direction of Bureau Chief Randy Novak, for their diligence and tenacity to assure these programs were approved.

Paul is being recognized for his volunteer efforts as coordinator for the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation's Greater Cincinnati Regional Golf Outing.

Paul's nomination for this award was supported by many firefighters and fire service survivors who have worked with him in this endeavor, including Arlene Zang. A portion of her nominating letter is reprinted below:

"I could never imagine the effect that the death of a firefighter has on a family until my daughter, Captain Robin Broxterman, made the ultimate sacrifice when the floor collapsed at a house fire. Thanks to assistance from the National Fallen Firefighter Survivors' Programs, we were able to put our family back together. Unfortunately, there is no direct support and no assurance that these services will be available for other devastated families when tragedy strikes.

Paul Riedel witnessed the effect of these programs, understood their impact, and recognized the need for funding. Firefighting is Paul's first love, but his passion is helping others. He is wholly dedicated to providing the survivors the help and support they need to rebuild their lives. For the past 5 years, Paul has been supervising the Greater Cincinnati Regional Golf outing. He organizes a small army of volunteers and all the proceeds go to support the survivors program. There is little debate about the success of the outing. It is one of the most successful in the nation. Paul travels to Maryland every year to share his knowledge with



other coordinators and, as a result of his efforts, there are now golf outings supporting the NFFF's survivor programs in many other states.

Paul Riedel is both professional and compassionate. He is the firefighter that other firefighters strive to be. Paul has provided much needed emotional assistance to me and my family. He is our hero and I am honored to know him. I continue to have good days and tough ones, but I am always inspired by Paul's determination and commitment to our family and to the fire service, especially the survivor families."

MEET THE BOARD: CHIEF DENNIS COMPTON



he Foundation is very fortunate to have a dedicated Board of Directors that is committed to our mission of honoring fallen firefighters, helping their families, and preventing firefighter

injuries and fatalities. Over the next several issues, we will introduce these distinguished members of the fire service and corporate world in this column.

Chief Dennis Compton was elected chairman of the board in 2008. He is a well-known speaker and the author of several books, including his latest, titled *Progressive Leadership Principles, Concepts, and Tools.* His previous books include a three-part series titled *When in Doubt, Lead* and another titled *Mental Aspects of Performance for Firefighters and Fire Officers.* He was co-editor of the third edition of the ICMA textbook titled *Managing Fire and Rescue Services* and has written many articles for various publications.

Chief Compton was fire chief in Mesa, Arizona, for five years and assistant fire chief in Phoenix, Arizona, where he served for twenty-seven years. He has served as chairman of the executive board of the International Fire Service Training Association (IFSTA), as chairman of the Congressional Fire Service Institute's National Advisory Committee. Among the many national awards Chief Compton has received are the 1991 George D. Post National Fire Service Instructor of the Year, the American Fire Sprinkler Association Fire Service Person of the Year in

2000, the 2001 Distinguished Alumnus of the Year by the University of Phoenix, and the 2003 Mason Lankford National Fire Service Leadership Award. He received the 2007 Metropolitan Fire Chiefs Association Lifetime Achievement Award, the 2009 Arizona Fire Chiefs Association Lifetime Achievement Award, and is a charter member of the Arizona Fire Service Hall of Flame.

Chief Compton states, "In my 43 years in the fire service, being Chairman is one of the most exciting opportunities I've had. The reason is simple...it's my respect for the mission of the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation and the people involved, especially our families, that connects me to the organization.

Honoring our fallen firefighters, assisting their families and departments when a fatality occurs, and working to prevent firefighter fatalities is a privilege. We must never lose sight of the sacrifices of our nation's fallen firefighters and their survivors, and I am honored to serve this organization."



PSOB Assists Families



n May 2013, the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation and the Public Safety Officers' Benefits (PSOB) Office were able to provide on-site claim support to the survivors of the firefighters who
