al Bruno was a legendary journalist who headed up political coverage for ABC and Newsweek Magazine, hosted the vice-presidential debate

of 1992 and also had a lifelong passion for firefighting. Only Hal could sit at a table discussing who might be the next president with Peter Jennings, David Brinkley or Ted Koppel but be just as happy sitting in a firehouse kitchen learning who might be the next fire chief while hearing details of a particularly stubborn blaze during the previous shift.

But Hal Bruno's mark on the fire service goes beyond politics. It revolves around a special relationship Hal had with the survivors of fallen firefighters.

As a charter member of the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation's Board of Directors, its chairman from 1999 to 2008 and chairman emeritus until his death on November 8, 2011, at age 83, Hal Bruno left a legacy that is unmatched in caring for the families, honoring the fallen and preventing firefighter deaths and injuries.

Chief Dennis Compton said that Hal had some simple but important advice for him when taking over as chairman: Care for the families of our fallen heroes as you care for your own.

There was no doubt that Hal Bruno lived those words in everything he did at the Foundation. Hal was always there when a survivor needed an embrace, their hand held or just someone who would listen.

And he did listen. When Hal learned that federal benefits under the Hometown Heroes Survivors Benefit Act were stalled, he worked tirelessly with the Congressional Fire Services Institute and others to get what had been promised

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to the families of firefighters who died in the line of duty from heart attack or stroke. It came at a time when Hal's own health was failing and he was considering stepping down as chairman.

Jo Ann Tilton of Katy, Texas, one of those whose benefits were stalled, recalls Hal pledging that he would not retire until he saw the Hometown Heroes claims being processed properly. She wrote upon hearing of Hal's passing, "He kept his word and did just that. Hal Bruno was a special, special man. He will be missed."

Sharon Purdy, of Spencerville, Ohio, who lost her firefighter husband, Lee, in January of 2000, said, "Hal was the strength that was needed by all of us."

When Hal brought me aboard in 2001 as executive director of the Foundation he set a guiding principle that we still follow to this day.


It is never about us. It is always about the survivors.

Just a few months later we were suddenly dealing with

the survivors of 343 FDNY firefighters and 4 other responders who died that day. It was an enormous challenge for a small organization with limited resources. But Hal Bruno never said no to what was needed to help FDNY and the families of those heroes. In fact, the work we were able to do under Hal's leadership after September 11 helped create today's National Fallen Firefighters Foundation and the services that are now available to the survivors.

Al and Maureen Santora, of New York City, whose son, Firefighter Christopher A. Santora, died on September 11, wrote, "His energy and vision and his perseverance created an organization that continues





to grow and has helped thousands of family members understand what the firefighter family is all about. His legacy will live on in all of us."

Bells Across America For Fallen Fire Heroes

"When a firefighter dies in the line of duty, the sadness resonates through an entire community. Through Bells Across America for Fallen Firefighters, everyone across the country has the opportunity to pay tribute to the lives of these brave men and women."

or the first time in the 30-year history of the National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Weekend,

the bells of the Memorial Chapel

rang on Sunday, October 16, to honor the fallen. As part of this tribute, fire departments, places of worship and other community organizations across the country joined the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation for Bells Across America for Fallen Firefighters, the first nationwide remembrance for firefighters who died in the line of duty.

The idea was suggested by Colonel Bob Ditch, USAF, Retired, and a fifth generation firefighter. The Foundation launched this grass-roots effort in July and encouraged fire department representatives to work with their local

clergy to develop an appropriate remembrance. The website www.bellsacrossamerica.com was created to explain the program and provide an invitation for departments to use.

The response was tremendous. From small, rural towns to major metropolitan areas, hundreds of fire departments participated. Many contacted multiple places of worship to ring their bells,


including 36 churches and other places of worship in Howard County, Maryland, 7 churches in the town of Mansfield, Louisiana, and 13 churches in

> the community of Mt. Lebanon, Pennsylvania. In the city of Woodstock, Illinois, the Opera House rang their bells while fire department members gathered outside. Other congregations shared a reading or prayer, sang a special selection of songs or observed a moment of silence during their Sunday service.

As the Memorial Service began in Emmitsburg, a video was shown of church bells ringing around the country. Later in the service, after all the fallen were honored, another video was shared of the 332nd Expeditionary Civil Engineer Squadron firefighters, who created their own Bells Across

America tribute. Stationed at an undisclosed location in Southwest Asia, they used a fire extinguisher as their bell and a spanner wrench as a clapper to honor those firefighters who made the ultimate sacrifice.

The Foundation plans to continue Bells Across America for Fallen Firefighters each year. From the outpouring of support this first year, it is expected to continue to grow as a fitting tribute from a grateful nation.


New Beginnings

EVERYONE GOES HOME®



n 1992, the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation was created to help support the surviving family and departments of firefighters who die in the line of duty. In 2004, we expanded our mission to include prevention of firefighter line-of-duty deaths. The 16 Life Safety Initiatives were developed to address preventable causes of line-of-duty

deaths. The Everyone Goes Home (EGH) program was launched with grant funding from Fire Act, and with the help of Fireman's Fund Insurance.



LIFE SAFETY INITIATIVE NO. 3 =

Focus greater attention on the integration of risk management with incident management at all levels, including strategic, tactical, and planning responsibilities.

The striking aspect of the Nation's fire problem is the indifference with which Americans confront the subject. Destructive fire takes a huge toll in lives, injuries, and property losses, yet there is no need to accept those losses with resignation. There are many measures--often very simple precautions--that can be taken to reduce those losses significantly.

These words were printed in the opening paragraph of the 1973, final report of the National Commission on Fire Prevention and Control, also known as America

Burning. Since then, the number of destructive fires has been reduced; and the number of firefighter fatalities has seen a steady decline. However, there are still simple precautions that can be taken to reduce firefighter deaths and injuries.

Integration of risk management with incident command has had many

positive effects within the fire service. Probably every fire service organization in the country continues to promote the integration through the use of an incident management system and adding tools like the Rules of Engagement developed by the International Association of Fire Chiefs, Safety and Survival Section. Essentially, every firefighter and fire officer is required to have a

situational awareness and make a decision as to whether the risk to their life or the lives of their crew is worth the potential outcome.

As noted in the 1973 report, there are some who remain indifferent to the dangers faced by firefighting. There are many who believe, "It simply will not happen to me." Furthermore, there are many firefighters who believe that operating safely will actually detract from the effectiveness of an emergency operation, that it will actually slow them down or prevent them from being

> operationally successful. This is in spite of the overwhelming proof that every industry that has focused greater attention to the safety of their personnel actually becomes more efficient.

> Integration of risk management with incident

management at all levels, including strategic, tactical, and planning responsibilities, is so much more than risking a little to save a little and risking a lot to save a lot. It's also about being proficient enough before, during and after an incident, continuously sizing up an operation and doing what is best for the community-saving citizens' lives, protecting firefighters from injury and death and protecting property.

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


