Firefighter Occupational Medicine

JoEllen Kelly, PhD, Everyone Goes Home Program



ll activities of the NFFF's Everyone Goes
Home (EGH) Program must support the
16 Firefighter Life Safety Initiatives – to
prevent, to the greatest extent possible,
line-of-duty injuries and deaths. Some of

these efforts can have almost immediate impacts—such as education and training programs—while others are recognized as long-term projects with important pay offs. The programs of Initiative 6 regarding medical and physical standards fall into this second category.

This past March, EGH hosted a meeting called Advancing Occupational Health in the American Fire Service. The goal of the gathering was to begin the process of improving how occupational medicine is delivered to firefighters across the country. In attendance were ten occupational physicians with strong ties to the fire service.

"Occ med" in the fire service can be offered by physicians who are department employees, or by doctors who are hired as consultants but who work for private corporations. The vast majority of occ med, however, occurs between the firefighter and his or her primary care physician (PCP). Often, these PCPs are not trained in occupational medicine or the particular diseases of firefighters, including coronary disease, stress injuries, and a particular group of cancers.

Having said all that, it is very important for PCPs to have what they need to care for firefighters. Much of what was discussed by the occ med docs at this meeting centered on building relationships, improving communication, and the development of education and training initiatives by the fire service for community-based physicians. Firefighters, as well, should have material to give their PCP at the time of the annual physical.





Glenn Gaines, Deputy Fire Administrator

It was with profound sadness that we learned of the death of Deputy Fire Administrator Glenn Gaines on Sunday, April 12, 2015.

He was universally respected and admired for his dedication to

all aspects of the fire service. Throughout his 35-year career, Chief Gaines led with quiet resolve and was committed to learning from the past to improve the future.

Chief Gaines served with the Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program for the Department of Homeland Security from its inception in 2001 until 2009. He was a principal architect and member of the senior staff for three of the primary grants managed by FEMA's Grants Program Office, and was the agency's lead in developing the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response Grant Program in 2005.

Among his many awards and accolades are the International Association of Fire Chiefs Metropolitan Fire Chiefs President's Award of Distinction, Metropolitan Fire Chiefs Lifetime Achievement Award and the International Association of Fire Chiefs President's Award.

Shawn Millington, Survivor and Memorial Weekend Escort



Shawn Millington was a big guy. At 6'4", he cast an imposing shadow. Shawn's handshakes and hugs were not exactly something to be feared as much as something to be prepared for. He also had one of the biggest hearts around. Shawn attended the 2006 Memorial Weekend, when his stepfather, Edwin King (2005-KS), was honored. Since then, Shawn returned

every year to serve as a family escort during the Memorial Weekend, and if you speak to the families who were entrusted to Shawn, they would tell you of his unparalleled capacity to love.

Shawn's generosity was matched only by his gentle nature. He had the ability to make whomever he was speaking with feel like the most important person in his life at that moment. He was equally comfortable acting as a family escort as he was talking about deer hunting or cars or firefighting, all of which were passions of his.

Shawn died suddenly on March 28, 2015, at age 44. He was doing what he always did—helping a friend—when he suffered a fatal cardiac arrest. The world is a better place because Shawn was part of it, and he certainly eased the pain of fellow family survivors who met Shawn. Thank you for your service, friend. We will miss you.

Shawn was an amazing, tenderhearted, compassionate man. A survivor himself, he always put the needs of other survivors and fellow firefighters above his own. He took his duties very personally, making sure the fallen and their families were honored and given the support they needed. He was always there to give hugs. If I was having a bad day he would call and make me laugh. He will be sorely missed by many, but forgotten by none!

Mary Wheatley, Survivor and Non-Profit Founder

Mary Wheatley became involved with the NFFF after the death of her son, Firefighter/Paramedic Christopher Wheatley (2010-IL), who died in the line of duty while serving with the Chicago Fire Department. In June 2012, Mary attended a NFFF Parents & Siblings Focus Group in National Harbor, Maryland, to gather information from parents and siblings regarding the types of support that would be most helpful for them. She became a member of the NFFF's Survivor Network, providing support to other moms who had lost a firefighter in the line of duty.

Mary also created the FF/PM Christopher D. Wheatley Memorial Foundation (http://cdwmemorialfoundation.org) in October, 2011. She wrote about that experience:

I had no idea when the doorbell rang August 9, 2010, that I would ever be able to exist without my dear son, Chris. I never thought I would be running a non-profit organization, taking classes in non-profit management, or hosting a fundraising event. I never thought that my actions would bring smiles to someone receiving a scholarship initiated from an organization based on the life of one of my family members. But here we are. Less than two years from Chris' passing, his spirit has inspired all of us to "pass it forward," bringing good from tragedy. Our intent now is to continue to honor Chris through HIS organization and to continue to work to help others whose intent is to serve their fellow human beings.

Mary, thank you for your outspoken, candid advocacy and your steadfast support on behalf of fire service survivors. We will miss you!

I can't begin to express the sadness with losing such an inspirational human being! I've developed some lifelong friendships with NFFF, and these are more like

family than just friends. Sometimes the greatest accomplishments are behind the scenes, and Mary inspired us Moms in so many positive ways!

He joined full-time in August 2004 and has previously worked in Fire Service Programs assisting with the LAST program and Memorial Weekend planning.




Survivor Donates Photo to Raise Funds for the Survivors Conference
