"Be a Hero, Save a Hero [®]" Award presented to 9-year-old Home Fire Safety Advocate

Ask most 9-year-olds if they would use their saved money for a video game system or smoke alarms; the vast majority would not only select the video game system but also tell you what games they would buy. But Hector Montoya from Texas is not like most 9-year olds. Hector saved his money to buy a new PlayStation 4 gaming system. After hearing about a fire that killed a mom and her young daughter in a Fort Worth home that had no working smoke alarms, Hector decided to buy 100 smoke alarms for his community instead of a video game system. This began his mission to distribute smoke alarms in his community and to raise awareness of the importance of smoke alarms. Since April 2014, Hector has donated more than 2,600 smoke alarms in his community.

In recognition of his efforts, Hector was the firstrecipient of the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation's "Be a Hero, Save a Hero®" award, sponsored by Kidde Fire Safety. Hector was presented the award at the International Association of Fire Chiefs' Fire-Rescue International conference in Dallas. Chief Ronald Siarnicki, executive director of the NFFF, said after meeting Hector, "If Hector is any indication of the next generation of home fire safety advocates, then we are certainly in good hands." Neal Zipser, community affairs manager for Kidde Fire Safety, was equally impressed after meeting Hector. "Hector's selfless act of providing smoke alarms in his community not only helps the people he gave smoke alarms to, but also raises awareness of the importance of properly installed and maintained smoke alarms."

Fraternity Hosts Fireman's Challenge, Supports NFFF

The gentlemen of the Theta Pi Chapter of the Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity at the University of Alabama in Huntsville hosted their first annual Pike Fireman's Challenge on August 23, 2014. The event raised funds for the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation and local fire departments.

For a \$10 entry fee, participants endured an obstacle course designed to simulate the challenges faced by firefighters in the line of duty.

Theta Pi was blessed with a staggering amount of local support. Teams with fire trucks from the Monrovia and Madison Volunteer Fire Departments attended to compete and socialize with spectators. Lowe's Home Improvement acted as the main sponsor for the first annual Theta Pi Pike Fireman's Challenge and donated over \$2,000 worth of materials to construct the obstacle course competition. Among the other sponsors were local vendors who served food and drink to spectators, local franchises who donated raffle prizes, and the UAH Hockey Team who came out in force to help with the event.

Thanks to the local sponsors, overwhelming attendance, and a lot of hard work, the Theta Pi Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha was able to raise \$6,000 in their first year. Out of that, they grossed \$2,500 of proceeds for donation. The National Fallen Firefighters Foundation received 50% of the proceeds, amounting to \$1,250. The remaining proceeds were split between the Monrovia Volunteer Fire Department and Madison Fire. The brothers of Pi Kappa Alpha hope to double this value in next year's Fireman's Challenge and can't wait to do it again.

Fire Service Tribute Ride:

A cross-country bike ride to remember and honor all fallen firefighters

am 24 years old and a recent graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Madison. For the past four years, I have worked as a firefighter and paramedic for the Town of Madison Fire Department to support myself during school. I am a second-generation firefighter. My father, Bruce Moore, had a career as a firefighter in Kalamazoo,

Michigan. Once I moved to Madison I became an avid cyclist, and during the summer of 2013 I made it a goal to bike to every fire station in my county. I would stop at the stations, knock on the door and ask for water and maybe a station tour. All of the firefighters were extremely welcoming and proud of their departments, and they really enjoyed showing me around. So I took that idea of visiting every fire station in Dane County, and I stretched it across the whole country. I have always been interested in traveling the country, but I wanted this bicycle tour to be something larger than that and to really represent the fire service in a positive manner.



In January 2014, I got in touch with Barbara King at the NFFF, and she helped establish the fundraising portion of the ride. I sent about 60 letters to different fire stations along my planned route, telling them who I was and asking if I could spend the night at their stations and eat dinner with the crews. Everyone was extremely helpful, and many different fire departments helped network to other stations in their areas. I was able to visit over 70 fire stations along the way, and every firefighter I met was helpful and supportive. I have found that firefighters from coast to coast are genuinely committed to helping others and serving their communities. It is very encouraging.

I established two goals for the ride--to honor, respect, and remember all fallen firefighters and to promote a positive image for the American fire service. Along the way many

donations were made, and a lot of good awareness was raised for the Foundation and the fire service in general. I spent one night with the Vigilant Hose Company in Emmitsburg, and I got to visit the National Fire Academy and the Memorial grounds. I arrived in New York City for the National September 11 Memorial on the evening of September 10.

The trip lasted 63 days, and I covered approximately 4,320 miles. I had 9 flats and had to change my tires in Wyoming and a second time for the rear tire in

Washington, DC. Otherwise, the bike held up great, a lot of it because of the helpful firefighter/ bike mechanics I met along the way. I was also fortunate enough to ride with many different firefighters and community members. I'd guess that I had someone riding with me around a third of the time on the road. I enjoyed all of the stories shared while riding.

Different fire crews went with me to visit various state and national firefighter memorials,

and together we were able to remember those firefighters who have died in the line of duty. There was even one opportunity in Michigan to dedicate a day of riding specifically for a firefighter who recently died in the line of duty. Things like this made the trip more personal and really helped to bring the focus home.

Many different unions, fire department associations, businesses, organizations, and individuals were willing to donate to the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation in support of the ride.

The people I met along the way were absolutely incredible. It has been the opportunity of a lifetime to have met so many great people willing to take care of me, as well as support their local fire department. I found it very encouraging and positive, and I hope that I was able to make a positive impact on you all in some way as well.

NFFF Supports Development of Resource for Child Burn Survivors

hoenix Society for Burn Survivors has launched an online version of its school reentry program The Journey Back. The program, used in over 106 hospitals across the country, was developed in collaboration

with experts in burn care, education, trauma, child development, mental health, fire prevention and families who have been through a traumatic burn or loss, to consider all aspects of a successful return to school. The online program allows for teachers, school professionals, parents, and peers to quickly access information to assist a child in the school reentry process after a burn injury or traumatic loss.

Phoenix Society encourages burn care professionals, mental health professionals, fire safety educators, teachers and family members to use The Journey Back program and offer it as an option when any child returns to school after a burn injury or traumatic loss. The complete program can be accessed online at no cost at <u>www.phoenix-society.org/</u> journeyback.

This program was developed through the collaborative efforts of a number of fire service organizations and corporate partners, including the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation.
