A CHICAGO AMERICAN reporter, Hal Bruno, was the
first newspaperman to reach
the scene of the Our Lady of

Bruno climbed to the roof of the school's south wing as firemen sought to chop their

way in. He said:

"The entire second floor of the north wing was involved, with smoke and flames rolling from every window and through the roof.

"Mothers ran up and down the street, crying and shouting for their children as the firemen pulled hoses through the crowd. Sirens were sounding in all directions.

"Firemen on ladders were attempting to fight their way into the building. One straddled a window sill and tried to get into a room where the children were trapped, but he was driven back by flames shooting over his head.

"I saw another fireman wrestling with a charged hose line at the top of a ladder. He was trying to put up a curtain of water so he could climb in the window. He disappeared in the smoke.

"A company actually was in one corner of the second floor. They were taking a terrible beating, but they wouldn't come out. The men took turns hanging from the window to gulp fresh air, then they would throw themselves back into the smoke and flame.

"But it was no use. The
