Paying it Forward: Fire Hero Family Member to Family Escort

The family of each fallen firefighter at Memorial Weekend is assigned a fire-service Family Escort to assist them throughout Memorial Weekend. At times, a Fire Hero Family Member volunteers to help other families as a Family Escort. Brian Schnibbe is a Fire Hero Family Member (son of Robert Schnibbe, NY - 2006), and 2023 was his first year serving as a Family Escort. Brian served as the Family Escort for the family of Brendan Luis Torres from Dalhart, Texas — aged 19, the youngest line-of-duty death in 2022. In his own words, Brian described his experience serving as a Family Escort.

"The task of the Family Escort is no walk in the park, and for me, it was such a raw emotional journey. This weekend was not about me. But my story, my history, my compassion, and knowledge of where someone might be at emotionally, I think, made me a perfect fit. I knew when to be where I needed to be on every level. The Torres family and I laughed together — we cried, we prayed, and we honored their son Brendan and his sacrifice in a way that they had never seen.

I look forward to staying connected with the Torres Family and attending next year to provide the same standard of excellence to another family. Until the day when no more nams are added to the roll of honor, I will be there serving."

The NFFF offers a variety of programs and resources for families of fallen firefighters with the understanding that everyone's grief journey is different. Our programs range from virtual support groups to in-person events, a bi-monthly newsletter, one-on-one counseling, and ongoing grief support. Our Fire Hero Family's feedback after every event is critical so we can continue to enhance our programmatic services.

Supporting Fallen Firefighter Families

Inaugural Retreat for the Adult Children of Fallen Firefighters

The Adult Children's Retreat was created in response to the recommendation of those aged 21 or older who lost their firefighter parents. Its purpose was to create a platform for people with similar experiences to connect, promote healing, discuss resilience, and build connections for the future. The inaugural retreat was held in 2023, with 17 adult children participating and providing excellent feedback for future retreats.

"I've been putting in so much work since the death of my father. To be able to set aside time for just myself and focus on healing with others who have been through similar situations was so powerful and meaningful to me. The experiences and discussions I had on the retreat will positively impact and propel my work in

therapy. NFFF gives me a chance to still have support from the firefighter community my father dedicated 26 years to and gives me back some hope. As a therapist, I saw the benefits for myself and my peers."

Our virtual meetings provide Fire Hero Family members with a place to share memories, celebrate accomplishments, and support each other in difficult times.

Expanded Programming at Winter Retreat Results in Record-Breaking Attendance

Over 100 family members of Fire Heroes attended the 2023 Winter Retreat — the best-attended Winter Retreat ever. Based on feedback from previous attendees, the 2023 Winter Retreat featured expanded programming, including facilitated discussion groups, a men's group, more activities for children, and a visit to a local museum.

NFFF Scholarship Program

The Scholarship Program awarded 63 scholarships totaling \$504,149 to family members of fallen firefighters. Recipients for the 2023/24 school year include 41 previous recipients and 22 first-time recipients. Scholarships are based on financial needs and academic performance, emphasizing those studying science, technology, engineering, math (STEM), and public safety. NFFF and its scholarship partners are proud to support these families and honor the memory of fallen heroes.

Preventing Line-of-Duty Death and Injury

Online Training Platform Expands in Modules and Users

The Fire Hero Learning Network (FHLN) is the NFFF's online learning platform with training modules designed to engage firefighters and fire officers at the operations and leadership levels. Twenty-two modules are on the site, including seven new training modules added in 2023. The network experienced a 4.2% increase in learning hours during 2023.

Uniformed Peer Support Groups and Line-of-Duty Death Outreach: Working Together

The Uniformed Peer Support Groups provide support to incident commanders and fire officers directly impacted by a line-of-duty death. In 2023, the Uniformed Peer Support Groups were added to the mission of the Line-of-Duty Death Outreach program, which delivers training to better prepare fire departments that experience a line-of-duty death.

Line of Duty Death Outreach and Research Group

The Line of Duty Death Outreach and Research Group continued its efforts in preparing fire departments for the unthinkable by delivering the insightful "Taking Care of Our Own" Program fourteen times in Alaska, California, Colorado, Maine, Maryland, Mississippi, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Wisconsin. The four-person instructional cadre walks attendees through the aftermath of LODD experiences with first-person accounts from the fire chief and Fire Hero Family perspectives and delivers ready-to-use information on developing and Handling an LODD SOP, along with the behavioral impacts LODDs have on families and departments. The presentations touched over 500 firefighters and officers.

The Story of Harrisonburg Tower 1

"The Story of Harrisonburg Tower 1" was produced and distributed by the NFFF in cooperation with the Harrisonburg (VA) Fire Department. The video recounts the events that led up to one of their members falling out of a truck during a response to a working fire, and the steps the department took to investigate how the incident occurred, management's role in the incident, and how to prevent such an event from occurring again. The documentary has been viewed 34,000 times since it was posted on the NFFF YouTube page.

Training U.S. Air Force Firefighters in Japan

In July 2023, Advocates Michael Anderson and Kevin Sehlmeyer traveled to Misawa Air Base – an air base of the Japan Air Self-Defense Force, the U.S. Air Force (USAF), and the United States Navy. Courses delivered included Attributes of Leading, Courage to Be Safe, Leadership, Accountability, Courage, and Knowledge (LACK), and Leadership so Everyone Goes Home to an audience of USAF firefighters, USAF fire instructors, and their Japanese counterparts.



Impacting Cultural Change Through Experiential Learning and Critical Decision-Making

The NFFF introduced a staff ride program modeled after similar programs from the United States Military and U.S. Forest Service. The staff ride program brings fire officers to a location where a firefighter fatality occurred and "immerses" the attendees in the experience through storytelling by those on the scene when the tragedy occurred. The NFFF also developed and implemented training targeting the decision-making process under stress, to improve how firefighters and officers react to the ambiguity and threats of the job.

9/11 Memorial Stair Climbs

There were 42 9/11 Memorial Stair Climbs in 2023, with nearly 13,000 climbers raising \$1,512,308. The 9/11 Memorial Stair Climbs are a way to honor and remember the firefighters who died on September 11, 2001. Donations raised by participants and sponsors support the programs of the NFFF and the FDNY Counseling Service Unit. Stair climb participants climb the equivalent of the 100

stories of the World Trade Center wearing an honorary badge of an FDNY firefighter who died on 9/11 or due to a 9/11-related illness.

Thank you to the participants, coordinators, volunteers, and sponsors of all the 9/11 Memorial Stair Climbs. A special thank you to Pierce Manufacturing and everyone involved in the Green Bay 9/11 Memorial Stair Climb, which raised about \$135,000—the most successful 9/11 Memorial Stair Climb.

There were nearly

13,000 climbers at 42 events, and they raised \$1,512,308.

Why I Climb

Stair climbers participate for many reasons – maybe they are honoring a loved one who died on 9/11 or maybe they just want to remind family members that their loss will never be forgotten. Here is an example of why climbers tell us they participate:



"I have participated in twelve 9/11 Memorial Stair Climbs in Charlotte, North Carolina. Each year, I climb in honor of FDNY Engine 205/Ladder 118. Their company lost eight firefighters on September 11th. The photograph of their fire truck with six of their members driving over the Brooklyn Bridge toward the World Trade Center towers is one of the most memorable images from that tragic day. Every year, when I climb in their honor, I think of their brotherhood and the sorrow these firefighters may have felt climbing up those stairs, not knowing if they were going to make it out. Climbing at the 9/11 Memorial Stair Climb honors those who did not make it home. I will never let these firefighters be forgotten. I think of them every day."

Fallen Firefighter's Widow Leaves NFFF a Generous Legacy of Giving



On December 17, 2000, after playing Santa Claus earlier in the day at the firehouse, Keith Purcell of the Southold Fire Department (SFD) responded to a fully involved garage fire. Purcell, a 16-year SFD member, suffered a cardiac event and died on the scene. Keith and his wife, Mary Jane, had amassed a vintage fire truck collection while they both volunteered with the SFD. Keith was honored at the National Fallen Firefighters Memorial, and Mary Jane became part of the NFFF community.

After Mary Jane died on February 19, 2021, the NFFF learned that she had designated the NFFF in her estate planning, gifting the

NFFF with the vintage fire apparatus collection and her antique collection, including furniture, china, and glassware. Mary Jane intended that the proceeds from the sale of her estate would go toward supporting programs for families of fallen firefighters.





In early 2023, NFFF staff transported the estate to Maryland for an online auction to benefit NFFF programs. The auction raised significant funds to support NFFF programs like the ones that Mary Jane attended after the loss of her husband. The NFFF is deeply humbled to be remembered by Mrs. Purcell and is forever grateful for her generosity.

2023 Congressional Flag Presentation Ceremony

On April 19th, the NFFF, the Congressional Fire Services Institute (CFSI), and the Congressional Fire Services Caucus conducted the 11th Annual National Fallen Firefighters Congressional Flag Presentation Ceremony at DC Fire and Emergency Medical Services Engine 3. During the ceremony, the leadership of the Fire Caucus presented 144 American flags flown over the US Capitol to the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation (NFFF). The flags represented each of the firefighters on the 2023 Roll of Honor, which included 79 firefighters who died in the line of duty in 2022 and 65 who died in previous years. Senator Jon Tester (MT), Chair of the Congressional Fire Services Caucus, and Senator Lisa Murkowski (AK), Co-Chair of the Congressional Fire Services Caucus, presented the flags to the Foundation.



U.S. Fire Administrator's Summit on Fire Prevention and Control

The NFFF was honored to again partner with the U.S. Fire Administration on the U.S. Fire Administrator's Summit on Fire Prevention and Control on October 10, 2023. National fire service leaders and federal government members – along with a virtual audience – addressed the critical issues of the fire service. Presentations were given on the progress of working groups



about codes and standards, EV and energy transition, firefighter cancer, firefighter mental health and well-being, fire service recruitment and retention, impact of climate change and the whole-of-government approach.


