But with the expansion of the criteria that honors fallen firefighters to include line-of-duty cancer deaths and death by suicide, we know that the number of families and departments we serve will just continue to grow.

In the coming months, you will be hearing about a **new initiative** that will bolster our existing public/private grants and donations. The **NFFF Endowment Fund** will offer a way for monetary donations to develop into long-term financial support in perpetuity. This opportunity for an **enduring legacy** will, in turn, ensure that the legacies of our nation's fallen firefighters—and those of their families, colleagues, and the firefighters who are following in their heroic footsteps—will endure, too.

Mission-Driven Impact: At a Glance

At the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation, we are proud—and humbled—to have **met our mission** in 2024.

HONORING FALLEN FIREFIGHTERS

With the expansion of eligibility for Public Safety Officers Benefits (PSOB), we **honored 224 fallen firefighters** in 2024.

SUPPORTING THEIR FAMILIES...

We welcomed **1,117 new Fire Hero Family members** to Memorial Weekend—the largest group that has ever attended the event in Emmitsburg. And throughout the year, we supported these new families as well as families of fallen firefighters honored in previous years via our in-person activities and virtual support and provided education scholarships to 59 children and partners of fallen firefighters.

...AND SUPPORTING THEIR COLLEAGUES

At Memorial Weekend, we offered support groups for all colleagues and leadership of the 224 fallen firefighters on 2024's Roll of Honor. Throughout the year, we provided peer support that engaged 124 fire departments. Our LAST team deployed to 142 local sites in support of departments that had suffered a line-of-duty death; we also assisted with over 200 PSOB claims per month. Our hallmark Taking Care of Our Own training engaged 766 personnel.

REDUCING PREVENTABLE LINE-OF-DUTY DEATHS

Our ongoing effort to reduce preventable line-of-duty deaths was more relevant than ever in 2024, with first responders facing catastrophic challenges like wildfires and hurricanes. NFFF's Fire Programs training events ran from January through December, reaching 421 attendees in person and 30,247 through virtual trainings.

Mission-Driven Collaboration

During the year, the Foundation also collaborated on various health and wellness initiatives; joined the U.S. Fire Administration and #FireServiceOneVoice partners in national programming and securing the reauthorization of the Fire Grants and Safety Act; and elevated the Foundation's presence through fundraising and communications efforts.

But it's our family and fire service success stories that are the true measure of our impact.

Our “mission first—people always” approach enabled us to **honor the fallen** and **support their families and colleagues**.

We will continue to be there for as long as they need us.

We Honored 224 Fallen Firefighters

On May 4 and 5, we hosted **over 1000 new family members** at the 2024 National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Weekend—the largest group that has ever attended the Emmitsburg event. We also welcomed **145 returning family members**, who shared their wisdom and experience with the newest members of the Fire Hero Family. **534 Honor Guard, Pipes & Drums** joined the team as we gathered together to honor the fallen and support their families.

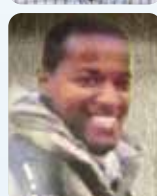

We Supported Families

The Family Programs resources for families are offered with the understanding that everyone's grief journey is different—and the programs that resonate with them differ, too. We provided a range of programs including in-person events, virtual support, a bi-monthly newsletter with family-created content, one-on-one counseling, and ongoing grief support. one-on-one counseling, and ongoing grief support. Our Fire Hero Family's feedback after every event is critical so we can continue to enhance our programmatic services.

Memorial Weekend is typically the first in-person introduction a Fire Hero Family has to the Foundation. With the largest-ever attendance of new families in Emmitsburg, our Family Programs team served and supported more family members than ever. The **1,117 family members** we worked with included:

- Children of firefighter: 54 minors, 168 adult
- Spouse/Life Partner: 115
- Parents: 79; Sibling: 113
- "Other" relationship (aunts, uncles, in-laws, grandparents): 588

We welcomed back **145 returning family members**, who provided a total of **726.5 volunteer hours** in support of the new Fire Hero Families.

We Awarded More than a Half Million in Scholarships

The NFFF Scholarship Program awarded 59 scholarships totaling \$538,893 to family members of fallen firefighters. Recipients for the 2024/25 school year included 47 female and 12 male students. Six families accounted for 12 of the scholarships—five are sibling pairs, and one are mother and daughter. Scholarships are based on financial need and academic performance, emphasizing those studying science, technology, engineering, math (STEM), and public safety. NFFF and its scholarship partners are proud to support these families and honor the memory of fallen heroes.

The Program is made possible by generous donations from Motorola Solutions Foundation, MissionSquare Retirement, the Alan Patrick Sondej Scholarship Fund, the Kenneth M. Scholarship Support: From the C-Suite—and from Individuals

Spotlight: Corporate Support that Changes Lives

In April 2005, **Motorola Inc.** and the **Motorola Foundation** jumpstarted the NFFF Sarbanes scholarship program by announcing a \$100,000 gift to the scholarship program on an annual basis. In 2010, that amount doubled to \$200,000.

In 2020, the contribution increased to \$320,000. With that contribution, the NFFF worked with Motorola Solutions Foundation (MSF) to reimagine how MSF's contributions would support the NFFF scholarship program moving forward—and the Motorola Solutions Foundation Enhanced Scholarship Initiative (ESI) was created. The ESI portion of Motorola's support awards scholarships to a recipient(s) pursuing degrees in STEM (science, technology, engineering, or math) or in Public Safety.

To date, Motorola's contributions include a **cumulative total of \$3,929,035.**

Spotlight: Supporting Students One by One

In late 2017, Dave Levy worked with the NFFF to establish the **Alan Patrick Sondej Memorial Scholarship Fund** for families of fallen firefighters. It was the first NFFF scholarship fund designated to provide scholarships that satisfy the **full four-year cost** of college tuition and books. The annual scholarship awards from this fund are available to a student(s) pursuing an education in a **STEM** field. In 2018, the first two scholarships were awarded under this program—and since its inception, the **cumulative total awarded is \$333,197.**

In late 2021, Dave once again worked with the NFFF to establish the **Kenneth M. Hedrick Memorial Scholarship Fund** for children of fallen firefighters, again designed to provide scholarships that satisfy the full four-year cost of college tuition and books. This annual scholarship is available to a student(s) pursuing an education in the field of **Public Safety**. In 2022, the first scholarship was awarded under this program; to date, the **cumulative total awarded is \$46,421.**

We Sent Kids to Camp

In the spring, the NFFF sent children of fallen firefighters to camp. With two age levels (ages 4-6 and ages 7-17), our **Kids Camps** offered the healing chance to just “be kids.”

For the older group, NFFF partnered with **Comfort Zone Camp** to provide a weekend-long experience. Campers were paired one-on-one with Big Buddies—many of whom were firefighters.

Camp HAL (Healing After Loss) for the younger group was led by licensed therapists who specialize in working with young children who are grieving. With support from NFFF staff and volunteers, the program used play therapy to help children express themselves in their natural language. Children stayed with their parent overnight.

We Launched the Family Conference

When a first responder dies in the line of duty, life changes forever for loved ones left behind. For adult family members of firefighters who have been honored at the **National Fallen Firefighters Memorial**, the Fire Hero Family Conference provided a place to go to find support and comfort, make new friends, and create new memories.



At the inaugural Conference, 66 spouses, parents, siblings, and adult children of fallen firefighters attended workshops on a variety of topics related to grief, wellness, self-care, and practical skills. Bonding with others that have experienced a similar loss fostered the building of lasting and supportive friendships.

We Welcomed Families During the Holidays

For Fire Hero Family members who have lost a firefighter in the line of duty, the holidays can be an especially challenging time of year.

The annual **Fire Hero Family Winter Retreat** welcomed family members of all ages and focused on service, self-care, reflection, and fellowship. Fire Hero Families enjoyed time connecting with each other for support — and attended the annual **Tree Lighting** at Memorial Chapel in Emmitsburg, where trees are adorned with ornaments representing every firefighter who has been honored at the Memorial.

We Made Prevention a Top Priority

20th Anniversary Firefighter Life Safety Summit

St. Louis, MO – 164 attendees

2024 marked the 20th anniversary of the pivotal fire service gathering that launched the **16 Firefighter Life Safety Initiatives** (16FLSIs). These foundational initiatives laid the groundwork and became cornerstones of safety training throughout the United States fire service. The initiatives have served—directly and indirectly—as the catalyst to a wide range of safety improvements across the fire service.

The 2024 Summit maintained a laser focus on the quest to reduce preventable line-of-duty deaths by examining the continued impact of the 16 FLSIs as written, considering the need to streamline them in recognition of what has been accomplished, and exploring how to be responsive to today's firefighters *and* tomorrow's leaders. The emphasis was to draw as many firefighters with 15 years or less, as they would be charged with implementation of the outcomes.

Chief Dennis Jenkerson and the members of the St. Louis Fire Department co-hosted the gathering, which was dedicated to **fallen St. Louis firefighter Benjamin Polson**. Firefighter Polson, a second-generation firefighter, was killed in the line of duty in 2022 fighting a fire in a structure later determined to be vacant.

Fellows Meeting

CFSI – Washington DC – 19 State Leads

The State Leads from Region 5 met to discuss the objectives of the EGH Strategic Plan. Each state was invited to outline the support needed to meet objectives of the Advocate program successfully. To foster the training of rising leadership, State Leads who attended were required to bring their successor with them; successors could be from within the advanced group or outside.

NFFF Fellows Program: Lessons from West Texas

Waco Emergency Services Education Center – 17 Fellows

The NFFF Fellow Development and Staff Ride, West TX, built on academic instruction provided to the Fellows during the CFSI 34th Annual Dinner and Symposium. The 2-day facilitated workshop provided a case study of the **2013 West Fertilizer Plant Explosion**, which resulted in **15 fatalities and approximately 200 injuries**; survivor and witness accounts' facilitated discussion; and a staff ride to significant sites and the West Memorial.

Discussions focused on the aftermath—including hypotheticals on what changes to the regulatory process could prevent or reduce the impact of future events—and application of communication tools already learned. The Texas State Fire Marshal's Report was used as a reference and advance study guide.

New Horizons – Two Parts

Orem, UT – 34 Wildland Firefighters

An increasing number of firefighters are facing fire operations in the “wildand-urban interface”: areas that were once pure wildland but where homes are now being built. Recent calamities in Lahaina (HI), Greenville (CA), and Paradise (CA) illustrate the immense destruction that can result from fighting fires that present two different conditions. In fact, firefighters at these incidents reported being overwhelmed by the size, speed, and destruction of each fire.

New Horizons took place at the **Utah Valley Fire Rescue Academy** and focused on orienting “new” firefighters (federal world) to the world of “other” firefighters. The course discussed the roles of USFA, DHS, and the NFPA standards and showcased NFFF tools available through its **Taking Care of Our Own** (TCOOO) program, **Local Assistance State Teams** (LAST), and other training and education programs designed to enhance teamwork and incident orientation and included an NFFF “After-Action Review” class.

High School Fire & EMS Cadet Program Symposium

Detroit, MI – 89 attendees

Dating back to 2019, this annual series brought together stakeholders from 22 states and the District of Columbia for two days of learning. Attendees networked face-to-face with learning professionals, subject matter experts, and leaders of successful programs. 100% of attendees agreed that the symposium provided them with tools, resources, and best practices to use in their current program; a networking opportunity that enabled them to meet and interact with their peers; and that they planned to continue engagement with fellow attendees to share ideas and best practices.

A sample of topics: Fire Service Culture and what it means to cadets; mental health considerations; reflecting societal demographics in today's fire service; strategies to reduce bullying; and an intro to NFFF's vast training resources.

Leadership Management Conference

Prescott, AZ – 31 fire service leaders

The Conference took place at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University Prescott Campus, not far from the location of the devastating Yarnell Fire in 2013 where 19 Granite Mountain Hotshots were lost. The agenda included a full day of leadership deliveries from the NFFF's expanded programs, including Crew Resource Management, Attributes of Leading, Stress First Aid, and a primer on Day 2's memorable staff ride.

The following day's staff ride to the site of the **Yarnell Tragedy** followed the proven staff model that consists of three distinct phases: preliminary study of the Incident; an extensive visit to the actual site; and the opportunity for the group to integrate the lessons derived from the study and visit. In this way, the historic Yarnell event helped leaders learn from the past through both systematic study and the actual terrain.

Leadership Lessons from LODD Experience

North Beach, MD – 48 firefighters

This one-day seminar was made possible by a grant from BGE/Exelon and included two line-of-duty death case studies delivered by chief officers who functioned as the senior officer on scene or incident commander.

It recounted the events, remembered the sacrifice of the firefighters who died, and discussed the impact the deaths had on the department members—including the speakers. What's more, it aimed at providing a strategy to prevent similar occurrences in other departments.

Fire Hero Learning Network

Online – 30,247 trainings

The FHLN continued to grow its user base with a 7.5% increase in learning activity and 15.8% growth in classroom delivery hours. In addition, four new FHLN models were launched.

The Network's definitive impact was evident, with 14,967 users confirming "Improved Knowledge on Handling an Incident or Topic." Another 4,711 indicated that the training led to informal changes in specific practices, with many users confirming that it generated a revision to an existing Department SOP (2,489 users) and even generated a new Department SOP (2,068 users).

Expanding on the valuable story recounted in the Boyd Street Fire video production—which by 2024 had garnered a million and a half views on YouTube—the NFFF Fire Hero Learning Network launched its first **Interactive Case Story**, showcasing the events surrounding and the lessons learned from the 327 E. Boyd Street Fire that sent eleven LAFD firefighters to the hospital—some with life-altering injuries. The Case Story is one all fire departments can relate to—and learn from.

David Santos is the Battalion Chief of Training for the City of Colton, CA. Fire Department, a 50-member organization operating out of 4 fire stations. CFD protects a population of approximately 60,000 people. Chief Santos has been with the CFD for 24 years.

“In October of 2024, Perryton Assistant Chief Scott Glass was killed when a vehicle ran over a supply line, popping a coupling, causing three firefighters to fall. Our team deployed a Response Commander to support the Perryton fire chief during the planning of the funeral. We also deployed several honor guard commanders to help train the department’s members on funeral and honor guard protocol. Working remotely, we also provided communications support and assisted with writing press releases and handling media inquiries. A logistics coordinator provided coordination of resources that the department needed for casket watch, backfill for Perryton, and equipment for the funeral.

Since Chief Glass’s death, the Texas Line of Duty Death Task Force continues to provide support services for the agency and the family: referrals for mental health services, family care from our Family Care Team, and filing both State and National LODD benefits. We will continue to provide these services for as long as they need the help.”

We Climbed and Golfed to Honor the Fallen

2024 NFFF 9/11 Memorial Stair Climbs

NFFF's 9/11 Memorial Stair Climbs included 13,402 in-person climbers and 1,094 virtual climbers, for a total of **14,496** participants at 44 events. The 9/11 Memorial Stair Climbs are a way to honor and remember the firefighters who died on

September 11, 2001. Donations raised by participants and sponsors support the programs of the NFFF and the FDNY Counseling Service Unit. Stair climb participants climb the equivalent of the 100 stories of the World Trade Center wearing an honorary badge of an FDNY firefighter who died on 9/11 or in subsequent years due to a 9/11-related illness.

Together, the NFFF's 9/11 Memorial Stair Climbs **raised \$1,585,645** to support the ongoing programming of the Foundation.

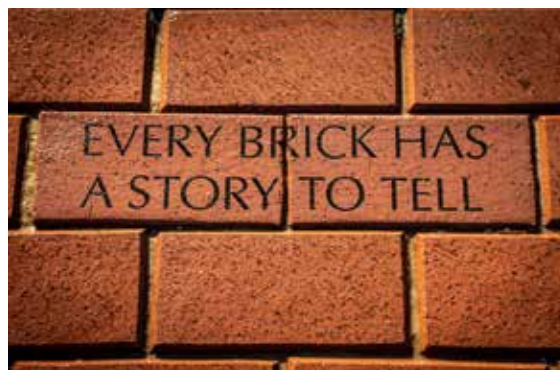

National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Park in Emmitsburg, Maryland, is a place of great reverence to honor our nation's fallen heroes. In addition to the National Fallen Firefighters Memorial and the To Lift a Nation 9/11 Memorial, another ever-present and living tribute is the **Walk of Honor**®.

Bricks on the Walk of Honor can be purchased to celebrate a variety of occasions, including recruit graduations, promotions, retirements, or to honor the memory of a fallen firefighter. Each engraved brick becomes a permanent part of Memorial Park, symbolizing a lifelong commitment to service and community.

Proceeds from the brick sales support the NFFF's mission to honor America's fallen firefighters and provide support to their families. Bricks can be ordered directly through the NFFF website, where customization options and donation details are available.



We Shared Our Mission Across the Fire Service

Throughout the year, the Foundation partnered with the U.S. Fire Administration to promote firefighter safety and fire prevention for communities across the United States—and around the world.

National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Congressional Flag Presentation Ceremony

On April 10, 2024, the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation (NFFF), in cooperation with the **Congressional Fire Services Institute (CFSI)** and the **Congressional Fire Services Caucus**, conducted the 12th Annual Congressional Flag Presentation Ceremony. Members of the Congressional Fire Services Caucus, including Senator Jon Tester (MT), Past-Chair of the Fire Caucus; Senator Susan Collins (ME), Co-Chair; and Congressman Steny Hoyer (MD-5), Co-Chair, delivered remarks and presented 224 American flags that had been flown over the Capitol Building to the NFFF.

The members of Congress were joined by Victor Stagnaro, CEO of the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation; Dr. Lori Moore-Merrell, U.S. Fire Administrator, and Deputy Chief Kenneth Moore of the DC Fire and Emergency Medical Services Department. Bill Webb, Vice-Chair of the NFFF Board of Directors and Executive Director of the Congressional Fire Services Institute, served as the Master of Ceremonies.

The flags were presented to Fire Hero Families at the National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Service held on Sunday, May 5, 2024, in Emmitsburg, Maryland.

U.S. Fire Administrator's Summit on Fire Prevention and Control

The National Fallen Firefighters Foundation (NFFF) partnered with the United States Fire Administration (USFA) to host the third annual U.S. Fire Administrator's Summit on Fire Prevention and Control. Held on October 8, 2024, on the campus of the National Emergency Training Center in Emmitsburg, MD, the Summit was attended by fire service leaders from across the country, as well as viewed online.

Members of the Biden Administration heard testimony from national fire service leaders on climate change, building codes, recruitment and retention, firefighter health and safety, EMS, and the new national fire data platform NERIS.

The Summit also featured a series of "State of Science" presentations focused on Structure Fire Impact and Resilience, Science to the Station, Climate Driven Data and Technology, and the USFA Wildfire Evacuation Project.



#Fire Service One Voice: Fire Stop Tour

The National Fallen Firefighters Foundation (NFFF) joined the United States Fire Administration (USFA) and several of our national fire partners in USFA's second annual Fire Stop Tour. The tour, which visited fire departments in Detroit, MI, Chicago, IL, and Columbus, OH, highlighted the continued fire problem in the nation, as well as winter weather preparedness.

NFFF was joined on the tour by representatives from the International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC), the

International Association of Fire Fighters (NFFF), the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the National Fire Sprinkler Association (NFSA), the National Volunteer Fire Council (NVFC), and UL's Fire Safety Research Institute (FSRI).

Legislative Activities

The National Fallen Firefighters Foundation (NFFF), in partnership with many of the national fire service organizations, successfully advocated for federal legislation benefiting America's fire service and promoting firefighter health and safety.

On July 9th, President Biden signed into law the **Fire Grants and Safety Act** (PL 118-67). The legislation reauthorized the United States Fire Administration (USFA), the Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) Program, and the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant Program through Fiscal Year 2028. The grant programs were facing a statutory sunset of October 1, 2024, meaning if Congress had failed to act, these programs would be lost forever. The passage of this legislation is the culmination of more than two years of work by nearly 40 national fire service organizations and countless individuals, including NFFF Advocates, Fellows, LAST team members, and Fire Hero Family Members, who reached out to Congress to advocate for these programs.

On December 12, 2024, President Biden signed into law the **Firefighter Cancer Registry Reauthorization Act** (PL 118-147). The legislation reauthorized the National Firefighter Registry for Cancer through Fiscal Year 2028. The bill was originally introduced by the late Congressman Bill Pascrell of New Jersey, a longtime co-chair of the Congressional Fire Services Caucus and a staunch supporter of the nation's fire service.



World Fire Congress

On May 7th & 8th, 2024, the United States Fire Administration (USFA) hosted the Inaugural World Fire Congress in Washington, DC. The National Fallen Firefighters Foundation (NFFF) provided planning, administrative, and logistical support to USFA for the event.

This historic meeting saw representatives from 56 nations united for the first time to address the challenges facing the fire services worldwide. The World Fire Congress was established to foster international cooperation and understanding among fire service leaders, recognizing the common challenges.

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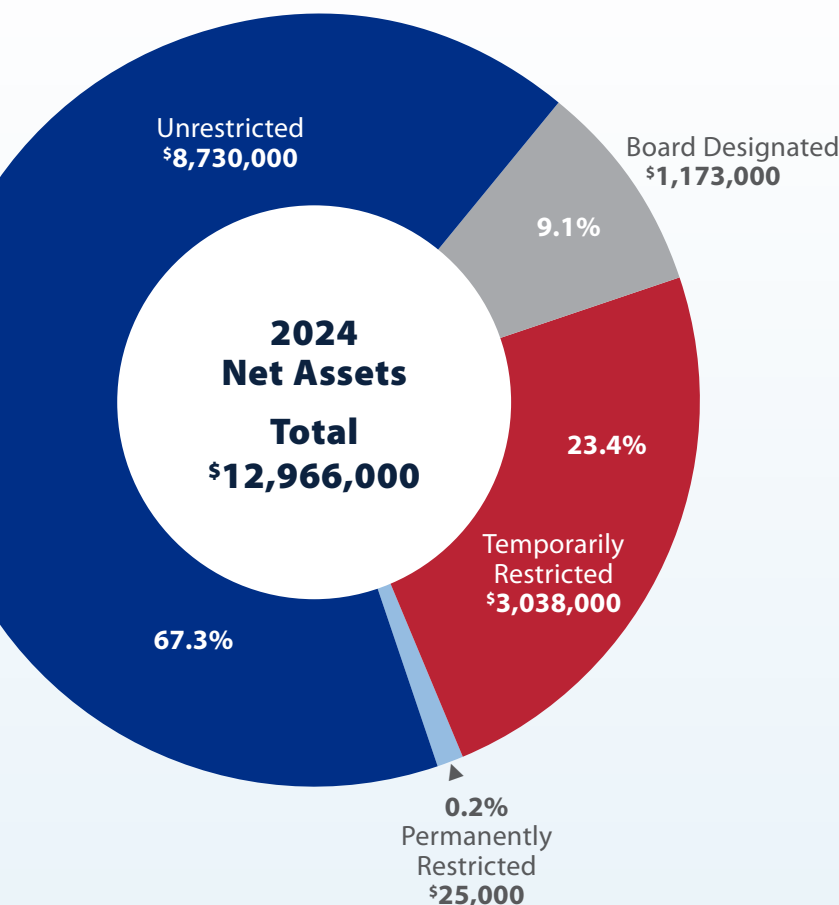
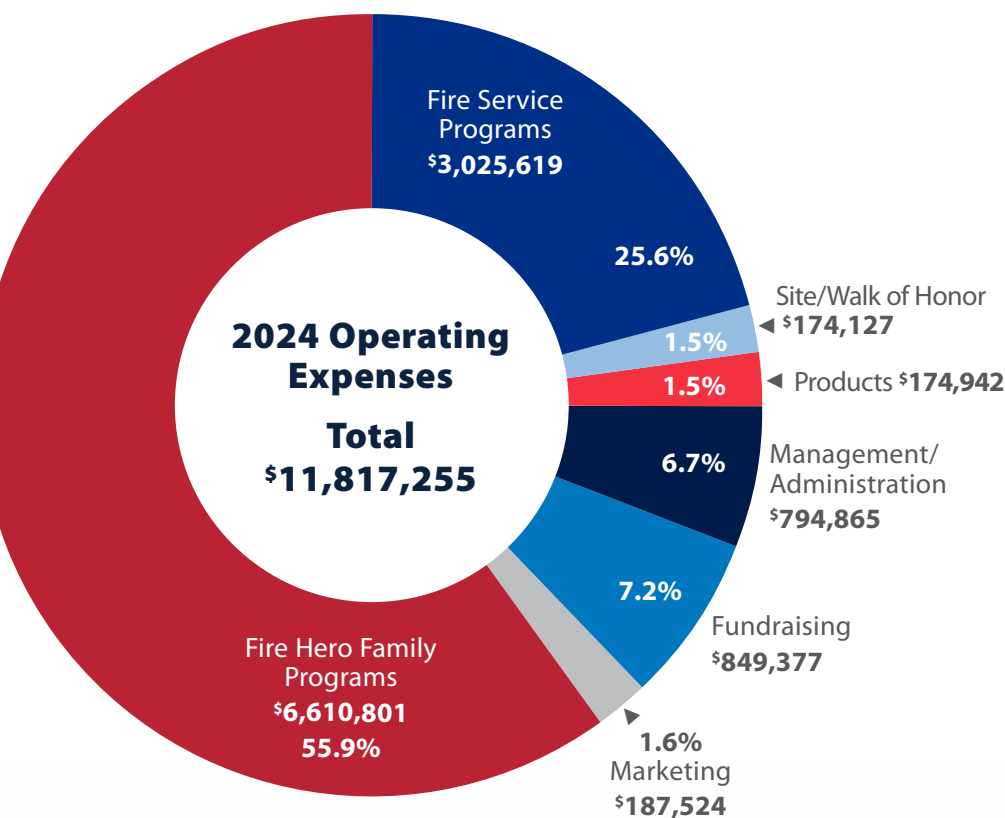
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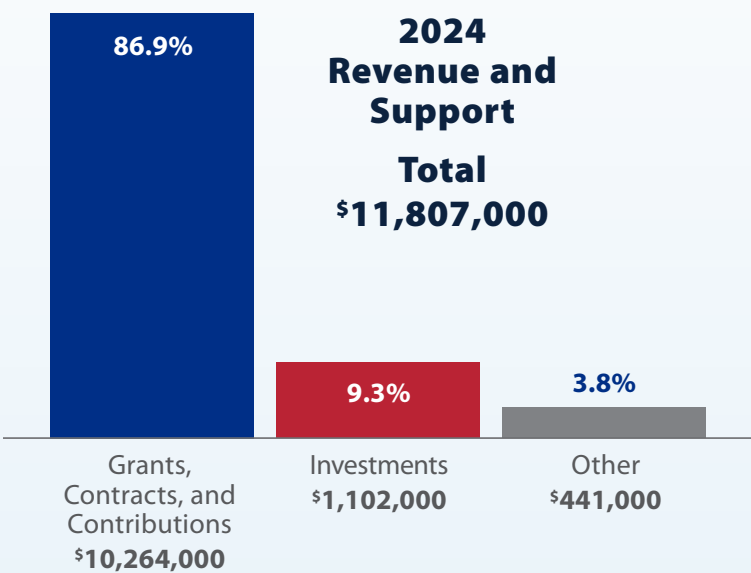

In 2024, we honored 224 fallen firefighters – the most ever memorialized at Memorial Weekend in Emmitsburg. We hosted more families than ever before: over 1,000 onsite. We also secured a sizable new contract with USFA to broaden our efforts of prevention.

Reflecting on the Past Year—and Looking Ahead

This past year, a powerful and humbling moment for me occurred during the **National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Service**, where we honored **224 fallen firefighters**. The inclement weather forced the ceremony to move indoors—but an amazing group of people worked behind the scenes to make the transition seamless. The tribute remained heartfelt, dignified, and deeply meaningful and was a fitting reminder that rain or shine, we will *always* stand together to honor the courage and sacrifice of our fallen heroes.

Throughout the year, I found myself deeply moved on more than one occasion. Attending our **Hal Bruno Kids Camps** and watching these young people laugh, bond, and grow together was nothing short of inspiring. In the face of unimaginable loss, they've found strength in each other. It was a privilege to be there to see them offer support, share stories, and learn to create space for joy and healing.

The **Fire Hero Family Conference in Mesa, Arizona** was another profound gathering. Being with families from all over the country—each carrying their own stories of sacrifice—reminded me that while loss may be deeply personal, healing can be beautifully communal. We found comfort in shared memories, strength in shared purpose, and it was genuinely inspirational.

And later in the year, the **Winter Retreat and Tree Lighting Ceremony** offered a time for peaceful reflection. There is something so comforting about standing among families under the glowing trees lit in honor of those we've lost—another powerful reminder that their light continues to shine in our hearts.

This year also brought growth and vision through the **Firefighter Life Safety Summit**. The collaborations and commitments made there reinforced the importance of continual progress. It was a moment to look both backward and forward—to honor those we've lost while fighting to ensure fewer names are added to the list.

Looking ahead, the NFFF is deeply honored to take part in a special memorial in **New York City**, where we will pay tribute to **176 firefighters who died as a result of their work in the rescue and recovery efforts following the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks**. This solemn occasion will honor their extraordinary sacrifice and serve as a powerful reminder of the long-lasting impact of 9/11. It will be a moment to stand together in reflection, in remembrance, and in gratitude for their bravery and selflessness.

With every event, handshake, tear, and story shared this past year, one truth remains clear: though our heroes may be gone, their spirit lives on—in every life they touched, and in every heart that remembers.

Here's to continuing the mission, walking alongside these incredible families, and never letting the flame of remembrance go out.
